As we enter into the first month of the new year, I want to remind you of some upcoming events.

On January 6<sup>th</sup>, Bishop Councell will visit St. John's. While his visit is important, he will also confirm and receive a number of people from local parishes into Christ's "...One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church...". It is also the Feast of the Epiphany,

the season of "God made manifest." I invite you to make a special effort to be present on that day at the 10:30 a.m. Eucharist. There will be an 8 a.m. service, as per usual, but I hope that most of you will celebrate both the sacrament of Confirmation and the Bishop's Visit at 10:30 a.m.


The other January event is the Annual Congregational Meeting, which will take place on January 20<sup>th</sup>, following the 10:30 a.m. Eucharist. It is a time when the annual budget is presented to the congregation, along with ministerial reports and the election of delegates to Diocesan Convention and Woodbury Convocation. This year, the delegates elected for convention will also serve as electors for the new Bishop at a special convention in May. Please note that the budget is approved by the vestry and *presented* at the Annual Meeting.

- The congregation is presented with an already-approved budget for 2013. The finance committee and vestry have been working hard to present a workable and balanced budget for the year. We are open to questions and will provide explanations.
- We will also elect members to the Vestry to serve 3-year terms (3 positions), and to serve an unexpired term of one year (1 position).
- The Vestry will also need to elect a clerk of the vestry and a treasurer.

It is my hope that you will consider serving in the open positions mentioned above and that you will come to the meeting prepared to elect the needed delegates and vestry members. As usual, lunch will be provided.

Finally (and I hope *finally*), my surgery is scheduled for January 21<sup>st</sup>, at Jefferson University Hospital in Philadelphia. The Rothman Institute Surgeons feel confident they can help ease my pain. I am grateful for your support during these past few weeks and ask your prayers during my recovery. I look forward to being back to "normal" soon, with a target date of Easter or thereabouts.

I wish for you all a joyous new year. Fr. Steve




# **Christian Flag**

#### From The Deacon's Bench:

# The Five Marks of Mission – cont'd To Respond to Human Need With Loving Service

Hurricane Sandy blew through our area with devastating results. Today, there are still thousands of displaced shore residents and New Jersey, New York and parts of other nearby states are facing a long hard winter. The weekend before, my four siblings and I flew to Florida to be with our father as he celebrated his 90<sup>th</sup> birthday. We felt the tail end winds of the Hurricane as it departed Florida in our direction and waited nervously at the Tampa airport to see if our flight would be cancelled into Philadelphia. In fact, our flight was the last one to land at Philadelphia before they closed the airport for the duration of the storm. As we disembarked the plane, the crew was very disgruntled to learn that they would be grounded, and stranded, in Philadelphia for the next couple of days. I felt bad for them but none of us knew what was coming. In fact, my family stayed safe and warm inside our homes never experiencing the devastation so many others experienced.

It was very humbling for me as I began to realize that whole towns were wiped out, that life at 'the beach' as we knew it had changed. What didn't make much news was that even along the Delaware River there was much devastation, including one of our own families who was displaced for weeks and had thousands of dollars of damage. They lost all their food, they had to have all their flooring and carpeting replaced and they are still dealing with mold damage. I again was humbled to learn that other churches reached out and helped them. While I was gathering coats for St. John's Elizabeth, an elderly member of this parish had no food and no check until the first of the month. While Salem County was sending busloads of supplies to Ocean and Monmouth County, little to no effort was made to help local residents with damage.

I have learned now through a series of programs I attended that most churches are not 'in the loop'

with the Emergency Response System. There are actually two tracks that occur - one is the Voluntary Organization Active in Disaster (VOAD) and the Office of Emergency Management (OEM). Born after 9/11, this system is designed to coordinate the response to an emergency of any kind. In our diocese, Deacon Carmen Viola is designated as the liaison between the VOAD and the diocese. Since Hurricane Sandy, our diocese has begun creating a response system of our own to coordinate efforts. Our first efforts as a diocese were wonderful. For example, several Episcopal Churches in the immediate vicinity of the worst hit areas took an early lead in providing shelter, food and supplies. For example, Christ Church, Toms River, has become a distribution center for much needed cleaning supplies. Through their hard work and calls, they received a donation of 1,000 mold cleanup kits. All they needed were trucks to transport these kits to the church. A couple of phone calls and a little coordination and they had all the trucks they needed. St. Marks, Keansburg and St Mary's-bythe-Sea in Point Pleasant Beach served countless hot meals. As people from all over the country arrived to help, many churches stayed open just to be warm, lit, power stations for displaced people and house volunteers. The list goes on and on. And the work continues. But one of the lessons the churches learned was that if they had been tied into VOAD, many of their needs would have been met immediately. One church, for example, needed blankets. They just couldn't seem to get enough by sorting through bags of donated clothing, most of it unwearable. When the need was made known to Deacon Viola, he made one phone call to the Red Cross and the church had all the blankets that they needed.

This prompted me to ask some questions about our own involvement in our community emergency

response system. From the information I've gathered, it appears we need to update our participation in the community. We are not 'official' members of the Salem City OEM or the Salem County OEM, even though it appears that we are somehow a designated 'shelter' for the County. We don't have an 'emergency phone tree' of parishioners that we could use to check in on parishioners, particularly shut ins. As a parish we don't have an emergency plan should something devastating happen in our area. Now is the time for us to talk and develop some parish wide goals to care for each other and our community in times of disaster.

I have already spoken to a few people who are interested in being part of a planning team but everyone is welcome. We have a loving and caring church family here at St. John's who has already shown that they are willing to help others in so many ways, and by forming a plan, we will be better able to respond and tie into community programs officially. The Diocese has learned this through Hurricane Sandy and we will be better prepared for anything that might come our way. I sit in my warm home tonight on the Feast of Stephen as the winds and rains whip around me. I hear on the news that these same communities are facing more flooding, more oceanfront breaching, and more devastation. Let's get started!


